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SPLATSIN TE SECWEPEMCÚL'ECW FLAG RAISED AT ENDERBY RCMP DETACHMENT

Initiative represents an important step forward in reconciliation and community recognition.

ENDERBY, BC – In a significant act of reconciliation and community recognition, the Splatsin te Secwepemcúl'ecw flag was raised at the Enderby RCMP detachment on Tuesday, March 11, 2025. The flag now stands as a symbol of the RCMP's commitment to reconciliation and recognition of the Splatsin people as an integral part of the community they serve.

The event brought together community leaders, Splatsin Band Members, and RCMP representatives to mark this important occasion. **Bart Thomas**, a Splatsin Band Member, provided a traditional blessing for the RCMP detachment before the flag was raised. **Elder Randy Williams** addressed the gathering, sharing his thoughts on the significance of the flag raising. **Elder Adele Thomas** also spoke at the event, offering her perspective on reconciliation and community unity.

"Raising the Splatsin te Secwepemcúl'ecw flag at the Enderby RCMP detachment marks a historic moment in reconciliation," stated **Kukpi7 Michael Christian**. "It not only honours the presence of the Splatsin people in this region but also symbolizes a shared commitment to working together with mutual respect and understanding. As we look toward the future, it's vital that we continue building strong partnerships between Splatsin and the RCMP to create a better, more united community for all."

The installation of the new flagpole, now proudly displaying the Splatsin te Secwepemcúl'ecw flag, was completed by Splatsin Construction Services, a division of Splatsin Development Corporation (SDC), in January 2025. The project took four days, ensuring ample time for the concrete base to properly set and cure.

SDC CEO Grahame Go spoke to the important contribution of Splatsin Construction Services in realizing this vision: "It was an honour for Splatsin Construction Services to install this flagpole as part of a broader effort toward reconciliation. Through projects like these, we are not only strengthening infrastructure but also reinforcing our commitment to recognizing Indigenous history and presence in our shared communities."
